## *About the Trust*

The Summerfield Charitable Trust (SCT) was established by Ronald Summerfield, a Cheltenham antique dealer, shortly before his death in 1989. The Trustees have discretion as to which charitable uses to apply the funds.

In 2011 £495,933 was distributed in a total of 85 grants, from £500 upwards. A copy of the latest Trust accounts is available upon request.

**Charities applying to the Trust must be based in Gloucestershire, or they must be engaged in a project that is of specific benefit to residents of the county.**

*Viewed especially favourably are projects and organisations working in:*

- The arts, museums and the built heritage;
- The environment and natural heritage;
- Community work;
- Education, sport and recreation;
- Vulnerable or disadvantaged sectors of society.

*The Trustees ask applicants to show they have considered:*

- The impact of their project on the environment;
- Planning for long term self sufficiency, including training of staff or volunteers;
- The potential to work in partnership with other statutory and non-statutory funders;
- Their active involvement with the people who will benefit;
- The outcomes of the project or service.

**Donations are not given:** for Medical research; for private education; for animal welfare appeals; to fund trips abroad; for projects that have already taken place.

**Appeals from churches:** Appeals from churches are no longer considered; applicants are advised to apply to the Gloucestershire Historic Churches Trust to whom the Summerfield Trust makes an all-inclusive grant.

**Individuals:** Applications from individuals are no longer accepted. Should an individual resident of Gloucestershire need financial support for educational needs, they are recommended to contact the Lumb's Educational Trust. SCT awards an annual grant to Lumbs to enable it to support residents of the county on SCT's behalf.

Charities that have been in receipt of a grant should not re-apply for at least two years unless they have specifically been asked to do so.

**PROCEDURE:** The Trustees meet quarterly - usually in January, April, July, and October - to consider all applications received prior to the deadline dates.

## *Introduction*

2011 was an exceptionally challenging year for many charities as they adjusted to the current economic climate. Furthermore, many local authority services, that residents take for granted, were faced with reductions in funding. The work of the Summerfield Charitable Trust proved to be of particular value in helping to maintain the quality of life in Gloucestershire and the trustees have been active in searching for ways to grow our effectiveness by attracting new investments by way of donations and legacies.

Our investments continued to be managed by Smith & Williamson, ending the year at approximately £8.3m. This bodes well for the immediate and medium term future as the Trust seeks to continue its significant impact across the full scope of its grant-making categories and, if possible, maintain the value of the portfolio for the longer term.

During 2011 SCT awarded grants of £495,933 to a wide variety of good causes. We continue to encourage a diverse range of applicants and we are keen to be involved in projects, both large and small, that are imaginative and to which we can make a significant contribution.

We made a total of 85 grants as set out in this report. These include significant grants to Woodchester Mansion for their renovation needs, Westonbirt Arboretum for a major re-landscaping project; Cheltenham Citizens Advice Bureau to enable them to expand to other market towns; a further grant to the Nelson Trust for an outreach worker at the ISIS women's centre; and a grant to the Ruskin Mill Educational Trust for their woodland kitchen.

In 2002 trustees bought a violin for a gifted young musician, Matthew Elston who lived in Bishops Cleeve on the condition that he would make annual payments for it. We were very pleased to receive the final payment from Matthew for his violin and are delighted that his musical career has blossomed; he is now a member of the BBC Concert Orchestra.

The Summerfield lecture was given by Alistair Hignell, focussing on his fight against MS, which threatened to curtail his outstanding career as a sports broadcaster. This proved to be an exceptional presentation in a successful Literature Festival.

We paid the first tranche of the promised grant to the Cheltenham Art Gallery & Museum of £375,000 in September 2011, this will be followed by the second payment on 30 April 2012. It is making good progress with the building work and is due to re-open in 2013.

The University has relocated its art department to the Hardwicke site in Cheltenham. They have not experienced a drop in student numbers for any of its courses and the BA Fine Art degree will continue. Regarding the partnership between the University and the A G & M; it was agreed that the £60,000 grant SCT made to the University (for the Pittville Gallery) will be forwarded to the AG & M in March 2012. In return it is agreed

that the AG & M will host 3 external shows: the Jerwood; Open West and the Illustration show but they will not host the student shows, these will take place in the Hardwick campus.

We are an experienced and well-organized grant making charity and we are keen to encourage anyone who wishes to donate or leave money to charity to consider using the Summerfield Charitable Trust. Our Trustees are not remunerated for the time and expertise which they give to managing the Trust. We have been spreading the word about the Trust in order to encourage donations and /or legacies and have entertained local solicitors at a lunch at the Cheltenham Racecourse to encourage this. We also hosted a lunch with other Gloucestershire-based administrators and trustees of local grant-making organisations to explore this strategy further.

The Trustees are mindful that Local Authority funding cuts and financial difficulties are being experienced by many charities and threatening the future of previously funded services such as libraries and youth centres. We anticipated an increase in the number of applicants which has not materialised. Our concern is that charities may be reluctant to embark on project fundraising for fear of not being able to sustain on-going costs.

I am very grateful to my co-Trustees, to Lavinia Sidgwick, and to our advisers for their hard work and commitment. We were very sorry to hear of Dr Phillip Kingston's death in the autumn. He was a respected consultant haematologist at Gloucester Royal and a wise and enthusiastic adviser for the Trust. Julia Hurrell has kindly agreed to join the team of advisers with particular focus on applications from the City of Gloucester.

I have no doubt that 2012 will prove equally challenging for the many people who give so tirelessly of their time on behalf of charities in Gloucestershire. We shall continue to do everything possible to maximise the effectiveness of the Trust whilst being mindful of our long-term role as grant givers in the county.

## *About the Trustees*

### **JAMILA GAVIN**

Born in India, Jamila Gavin has lived in Gloucestershire for over thirty years. First a piano scholar at Trinity College of Music, London, then in Paris, she finally joined the BBC and worked as P.A. Director for Music and Arts on Television. On moving to Gloucestershire she turned to writing children's books, and has since produced numerous stories and novels for the whole age range, as well as plays for the stage, radio and television. She was runner up for the Guardian Children's Fiction Award, has been shortlisted for numerous other awards, such as The Smarties Prize and the Carnegie Award, and was winner of the Whitbread Children's Book of the Year Award in 2000.

### **EDWARD GILLESPIE**

Edward Gillespie was educated at Tonbridge School and the University of York where he gained a degree in Politics. He has managed racecourses since he was 21 and has been Managing Director at Cheltenham Racecourse since 1980. He is on the Jockey Club Racecourses Board and Chairman of the British Horseracing Authority Jump Racing Development Group. Since moving to Gloucestershire, he has served on the Boards of Cheltenham Festivals and The Everyman Theatre, which he chaired for ten years. He chairs Gloucester Cathedral Council and, as a Board member of the Local Enterprise Partnership, Gloucestershire Tourism. He is an Honorary Fellow of the University of Gloucestershire, a Deputy Lieutenant of Gloucestershire and an Honorary Freeman of the Borough of Cheltenham.

### **ANTHONY McCLARAN ,**

Anthony lives in Cheltenham. He took up post as Chief Executive of the Quality Assurance Agency on 1 October 2009, after nearly six years as Chief Executive at UCAS. He is a director of the Inspiring Futures Foundation, and was recently appointed Chair of the new All Saints Academy in Cheltenham. Anthony also sits on the Board of the Gloucestershire Development Association. He is a Fellow of the Chartered Management Institute, a Freeman of the Company of Educators and a member of the Honourable Company of Gloucestershire.

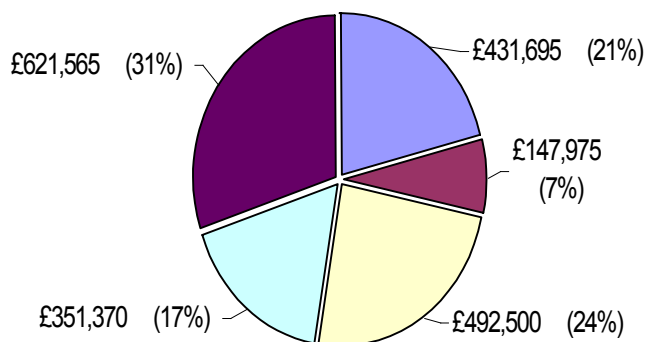

Figure 1: TOTAL GRANTS PAID – 5 year pattern

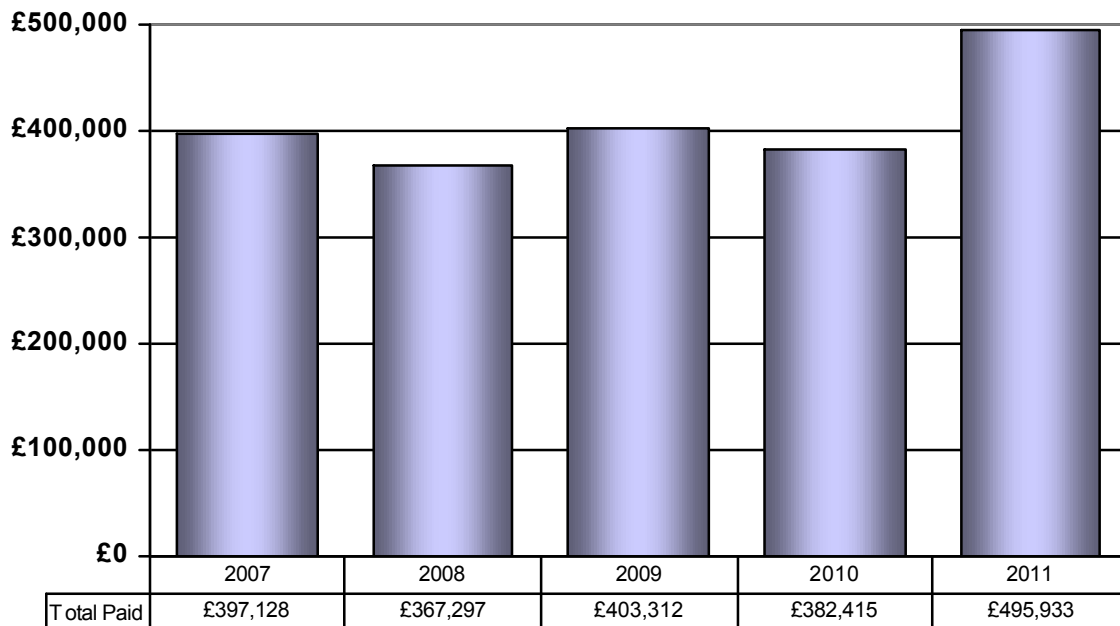


Figure 2: NUMBER OF GRANTS PAID – 5 year pattern

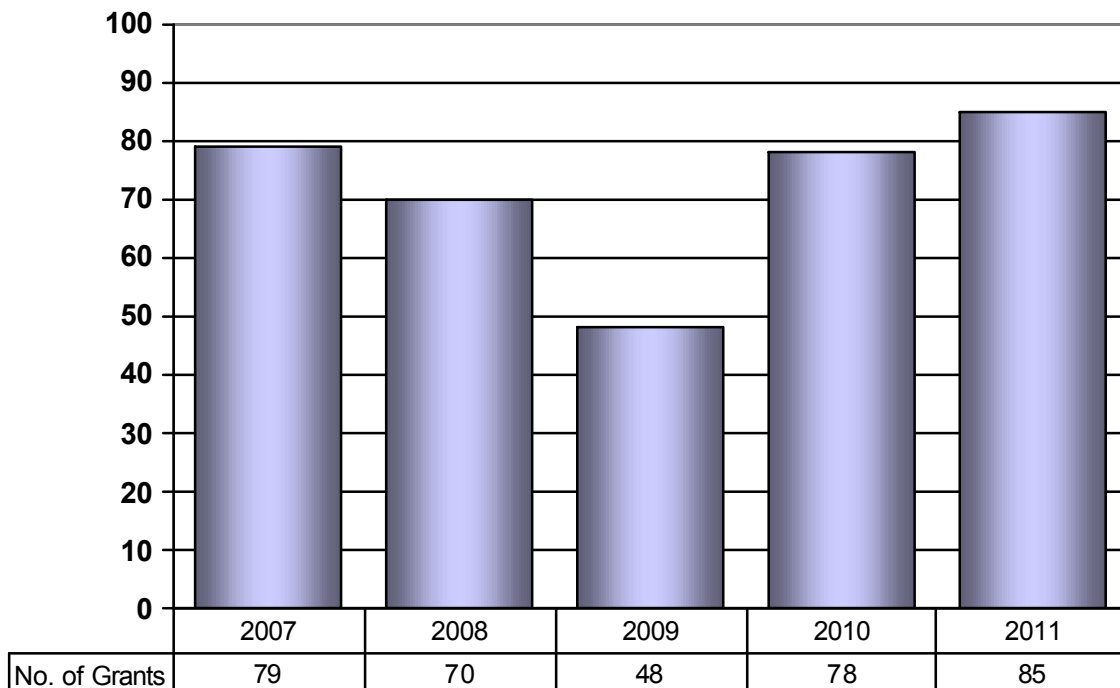
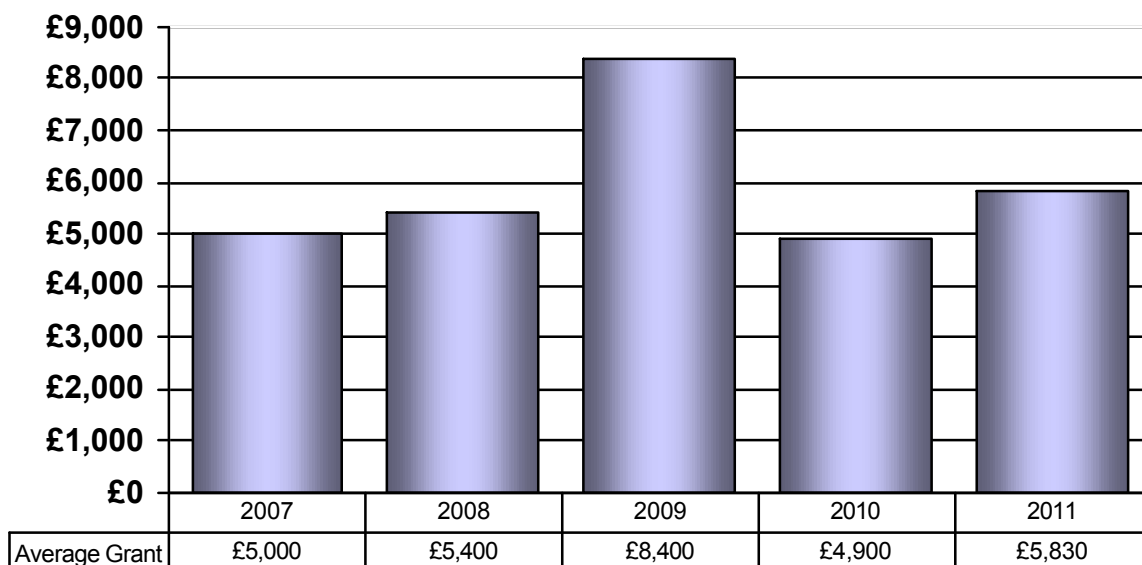


Figure 3: AVERAGE GRANT PAID – 5 year pattern
